

Farm to School and COVID-19

COVID-19 has impacted many of us around the state but farm to school continues on. Schools have officially closed for the rest of the school year, teachers are turning to digital instruction to support student learning, and farmers are shifting to online markets to sell their locally grown products. Teachers are sharing photos of their school garden plants growing, providing updates from the school chickens, and some are sending home gardening kits for their students and families to use. Beyond that, school meals continue to be served! The Arkansas Department of Education shared that 90% of Arkansas school districts are still serving meals versus 30% from around the nation! Thank you to the child nutrition directors, cafeteria staff, volunteers, bus drivers, and many more who make sure children in Arkansas have access to food.

Seamless Summer Option: Providing Multiple Meals at a Time During the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is working with State Child Nutrition agencies to provide safe and flexible meal service to children during the public health emergency. Under nationwide non-congregate feeding and meal times waivers, State agencies may allow Program operators to provide more than 1 day's worth of meals to eligible children via a single meal pick-up (by the child or the child's parent or guardian) or delivery. The USDA has made available a new publication which provides Program



operators with technical assistance on the amounts of foods needed for multiple day distribution, use of "bulk" foods, best practices, and parent communication.



Arkansas Department of Agriculture joins partnership to support Full Circle FarmCorps Members

The Arkansas Department of Agriculture recently partnered with the St. Joseph Center

of Arkansas to grow the center's national service program, Full Circle FarmCorps. Full Circle FarmCorps is a state AmeriCorps program that promotes food security and strengthens communities through farming, teaching, and outreach. This summer 20 AmeriCorps members will serve 675 hours each at school and community gardens throughout Pulaski County.

USDA Gives Out \$12.1 Million in Largest-Ever Farm to School Grant Awards

\$12.1 million was awarded in Farm to School Grants on June 29, 2020 – the most awarded since the grant program's inception – to 159 grantees – the most projects funded to date. These awards, administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA), will help bring fresh, local foods into schools and foster economic opportunity for America's farmers over the next school year.

USDA Extends Three Nationwide Waivers

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced on June 25, 2020 a range of nationwide flexibilities to ensure America's children receive the nutritious food they need throughout the upcoming school year. The extended waivers provide flexibilities on: meal pattern, meal service setting, and parent/guardian pick-up. These waivers give states, schools, and childcare providers time to plan for how they will serve children in the fall, including allowing for new and innovative feeding options as the nation recovers from the coronavirus. The nationwide waivers will remain in effect through June 30, 2021 for the School Breakfast Program, National School Lunch Program, and Child and Adult Care Feeding Program.






Apple Seeds Inc. is a non-profit organization that creates programs that educate young students about healthy food and increases their access to those foods. themselves food insecure. As of July 2020, they have donated 2,038 pounds of food to the Northwest Arkansas area.

Small Farm to Schools Act Introduced in House

Rep. Antonio Delgado (NY-19) and Rep. Jim Sensenbrenner (WI-05) introduced the Small Farm to School Act, bipartisan legislation that would create an eight state pilot program where local public schools would be reimbursed at a higher rate for sourcing school lunches from small farmers under the National School Lunch Program.

USDA Extends Free Meals for Kids Through December 31, 2020

On August 31, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue announced the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) will extend several flexibilities through December 31, 2020. The flexibilities allow summer meal program operators to continue serving free meals to all children into the fall months. Additional waivers are available through the end of 2020.

Center for Arkansas Farms and Foods (CAFF) Farm School

CAFF is part of the University of Arkansas System Division of Agriculture. The Farm School begins in January and is an 11-month, experiential learning program for beginning farmers of specialty crops or for those who want to learn how to grow food. The school includes both classroom curriculum and hands-on experience for integrating production and business and legal issues. Apprenticeships and outreach events offer continuing education to learn more about the skills needed for successful farming.
